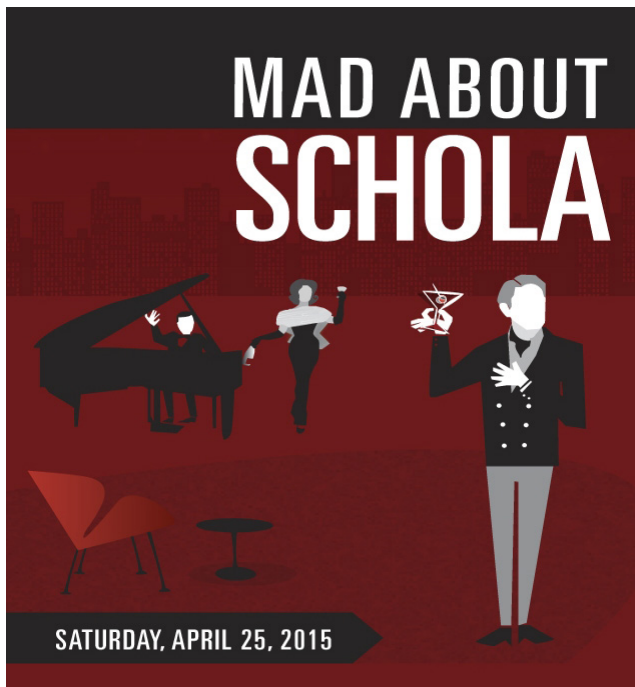

At a time when race relations are once again making headlines, and the movie *Selma* hits the big screen, it's serendipitous that we present a tribute to Martin Luther King, Jr. The members of Schola will *Lift Every Voice* to sing and speak the message of justice, freedom, and peace on March 14 & 15. From spirituals by Moses Hogan, to new and original works by two Schola members, the event promises to be uplifting and thought-provoking.

Schola vocalist Marjorie Halloran has composed an original work titled *Behind the Dim Unknown*, the centerpiece of the concert. This work is a layering of patriotic melodies sung by the chorus, and spoken word solos inspired by Dr. King's writings and abolitionist texts. We are honored to feature Judge Luckey as narrator for the piece. Luckey is the managing artistic director for the Palo Alto Children's Theatre. Dawn Reyen, Schola's assistant conductor and piano accompanist, has arranged two popular spirituals to close the concert: an a cappella version of *Free at Last*, followed by the inspiring *We Shall Overcome*.

MARJORIE HALLORAN, RESIDENT COMPOSER

A grad student in residence at the Vermont College of Fine Arts, with a decade of experience writing for choirs, **Marjorie Halloran** approached Schola's Music Director Greg Wait, asking if she could write a piece for an upcoming concert. He gave her free rein, requesting that it include a spoken word element. "*I had fun arranging the melody,*" Halloran says, "*and then taking it apart to make it unsettling.*" For tension, she added atonal chords, wrote pieces for higher registers, and scored portions where the choir holds long notes as soloists speak Dr. King's words. The 12-minute composition ends with an unresolved chord, "*to represent how far we've come, but how far we have left to go.*" The overall effect, from joyous to triumphant to bittersweet, "*should be hopeful and thoughtful.*"

Those of you who caught Jon Nakamatsu backed by our 90-voice choir performing *Petite Messe Solonnelle* can thank **Cathy and Steve Combs** for making the concert a reality. Seven years ago, Cathy and former Schola Board Chair Candy Pelissero met with Jon, and together they began discussing the concept of a joint Schola/Nakamatsu concert. Nakamatsu, a long-time personal friend of the Combs', was their son's high school German teacher before becoming a renowned pianist. *"It was a good way to marry the fact that we knew Jon so well, and to do something to benefit Schola,"* says Cathy.

Cathy originally joined Schola nearly 40 years ago, after she and her husband were strolling through the DeAnza College campus one evening. Cathy said she heard *"this glorious sound coming from one of the classrooms"* and, taking advantage of the rehearsal break, walked up to Schola founder and director Royal Stanton, asking about the group. With his encouragement, she auditioned and has been singing with Schola ever since.

"It's a community treasure," she says of the organization. *"As individuals, we choose to become a part of Schola, and therefore we are also responsible for helping it to thrive."* While there are many choral groups in the area, it's the caliber of Schola, she feels, that sets it apart, mainly thanks to Greg Wait. *"He pushes us to be better,"* she says, *"and every rehearsal is a voice lesson in itself."*



Aneka and Stephen Bear sponsored the December holiday concert, *Joyeux Noel*. When Aneka and Stephen received an inheritance from an unfortunate loss, they turned it into a blessing by donating to Schola's 2014 Fund-A-Need auction. *"There have been times when I couldn't make a large contribution in the past,"* says Aneka. *"It's not easy for choral groups to be funded with grants. We rely on members and non-members to make donations."*

A graduate in Vocal Music from San Jose State, Aneka had toured Europe and Australia with the college choir and appeared in numerous musical theater productions, but wanted an outlet for her singing on a regular basis. She was impressed by the broad spectrum of music that Schola performs – from spirituals to masses to Broadway show tunes. *"They're up to different challenges,"* Aneka says. And for a woman whose forte is music, she was game. Aneka joined the choir in 1998, and is now a frequent soloist. She also coordinates the six-week Summer Sings program.
